TFMS 275 – HISTORY OF COSTUME **FALL 2017**

Course Objectives:

This course is a survey of the evolution of clothing styles through history with an emphasis on Western costume and the study of historical costume as it reflects sociological, psychological, economic, political, artistic, technological, and other factors. Among the topics discussed in the class are the ways in which social rank, ethnicity, and gender manifest themselves through clothing and adornment, and how the historic evolution of clothing reflects changing roles of women and various historically marginalized groups.

Class time will be comprised of reading and film discussions, lecture, and project presentations.

Learning Objectives:

At the end of TFMS 275, students will be able to cite the relationship of fashion to the zeitgeist of a historical period as demonstrated by describing its influence on the political, economic, societal, and religious aspects of a historic period and geographic location.

Course Structure: This course meets three times a week on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10:40AM to 11:50AM in Montgomery Hall 120
